APPOINTMENT OF ACADEMIC DEAN

The Board of Governors of the Graduate Theological Foundation is delighted to announce the appointment of the Rev. Dr. Joseph Baunoch as the new Academic Dean of the Foundation commencing his duties officially January 1, 2006. Dr. Baunoch has long been on the faculty of the Foundation and now assumes the lead responsibility in monitoring and evaluating student performance and faculty involvement in the affairs of the Foundation. Dr. Baunoch administers the Orientation Sessions at the Foundation, chairs the doctoral dissertation defenses and will on occasion participate in orientations and defenses in Oxford.

Dr. Baunoch is The Albert E. Ellis Professor of Psychology and Counseling at the Foundation. He holds the B.Sc. in Theology from the University of Evansville, the M.Div. from United Theological Seminary, the D.Min. in Pastoral Care and Counseling from the Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago, and the Psy.D. degree from the Foundation. Dr. Baunoch has held teaching appointments at Calumet College of St. Joseph and at DePaul University in Chicago. He is also the Director and President of the Association of Pastoral Counseling Supervision (APCS), a P.R.I.M.E. program of the Foundation. In 2004, Dr. Baunoch began in his current position as Administrator of the Harbor Light Systems of The Salvation Army in Detroit, which is the largest addictions rehabilitation program in Michigan.

NEW DIRECTOR OF SLIM PROGRAM

Following Father Jorge Colón's stepping down as Director of the Spanish Language Institute for Ministries program owing to ill health, the Foundation has appointed Dr. Antonio Ramírez as the new Director and has named him The Bartolomé de Las Casas Professor of Hispanic Studies. The SLIM program offers masters and doctoral level degrees completely taught and administered in the Spanish language.

Dr. Ramírez was the recipient of the César Chávez Scholarship in Hispanic Ministries at the Foundation while working on his Master of Theology. He holds the Doctor of Philosophy in counseling from Saint Mary's University in Texas, the Master of Arts in educational psychology from the University of Texas, and the Bachelor of Arts in psychology from the University of California. FOUNDATION ANNOUNCES ADDITION OF UNDERGRADUATE DIVISION

October 2005 saw the official incorporation of Cloverdale College as the undergraduate division of the Graduate Theological Foundation. We extend a grand welcome to all of our Cloverdale students.

In the spring of 2002, Cloverdale College was established in celebration of the 200th anniversary of the founding of the Sunday School Union in the United Kingdom by Robert Taikes. Cloverdale College received a ruling from the Indiana Commission on Proprietary Education empowering the College to commence offering degrees in religious education, theology, and church administration. By carefully selecting and endorsing an array of quality internet courses and programs such as the University of Notre Dame's Satellite Theological Education Program and the University of Dayton's Virtual Learning Community for Faith Formation, Cloverdale College is able to create a sophisticated educational experience for every student. Cloverdale also provides opportunities to earn credit by attending summer sessions in Oxford and Rome. The College's impressive degree-completion program for religious educators and church administrators allows students to both maintain their work and complete their degrees.

Any student graduating from Cloverdale College may enter a Foundation graduate degree program as an alumnus, bypassing the transcript and reference letter requirements of new students. Transcripts from the College will reflect its status as the Undergraduate Division of the Graduate Theological Foundation. Cloverdale College students will fully participate in Foundation Convocations and Graduations while maintaining their own identity as Cloverdale graduates with distinctive transcript, school seal, and institutional colors.

INAUGURAL VIIPS INSTITUTE

In November, 2005, the Foundation hosted its first VIIPS Institute designed for clergy, religious, and laity desiring to pursue graduate religious studies in the Vietnamese language. Under the leadership of the VIIPS Director, the Rev. Peter Thang Cong Ngo, J.C.L., D.Min., Ph.D., the Institute hosted nine students. Fr. Ngo was assisted by the Associate Director of the VIIPS program, Sister Thuy Thu Thi Nguyen, FSP, D.Min. (cand.). The Vietnamese International Institute for Pastoral Studies hosts two annual residency sessions at the Chancery in the Archdiocese of Los Angeles.

FORMATION OF HERNANDEZ READING ROOM

The Foundation is pleased to announce that we have named the reading room in the Student Center of the Tower Building for the Rev. Dr. Robert Hernández in

appreciation for his kind gift in December, 2005 of outstanding theological books. Dr. Hernández received his engineering degree from Purdue University and his Master of Divinity from the Episcopal Seminary of the Southwest in Austin, Texas. He also holds a Master of Arts in Counseling from Indiana University and the Doctor of Philosophy in Pastoral Psychology from the Graduate Theological Foundation where, following doctoral studies at Oxford University's summer program in theology, he presented a dissertation entitled, "An Enabling Approach to Counseling the Individual: From Low Self Concept to High Self Esteem Through Pastoral Psychology." Dr. Hernández is an Episcopal priest in the Anglo-Catholic tradition which is reflected in his library gift.

OXFORD & ROME SUMMER REGISTRATION

Both the Centro Pro Unione in Rome and the Oxford University Summer Programme in Theology now have their programs available for enrollment. Foundation students are encouraged to enroll early as these two programs fill up quickly. Father Bernie O'Connor of the Congregation of Eastern Churches at the Vatican Curia, has been asked by Oxford to teach a course this summer entitled, "The Papacy in the Modern World," based on his latest book entitled, *Papal Diplomacy*, a topic upon which he gave a lecture at Oxford this past summer. Dr. Morgan's course this summer "Being Human and Being Good" is based on his latest book, *Naturally Good: A Behavioral History of Moral Development*. A VISIT FROM ROME

This past autumn, the Foundation was privileged to have a visit from our Karl Rahner Professor of Catholic Theology, the Rev. Dr. Dennis Billy, who is Professor of Moral Theology at the Accademia Alfonsiana in Rome. Father Billy was in town negotiating a book contract with Ave Maria Press at Notre Dame for the writing of six books in the classic tradition of Catholic spirituality. Father Billy holds the Th.D. from Harvard, the S.T.D. from the Angelicum, and the D.Min. from the Foundation. 2006 GRADUATION PREPARATIONS

In anticipation of a large graduating class and attendance at the Foundation's 41st annual Convocation and Graduation ceremony, we have arranged for the use of the Bendix Theatre in the Civic Center of South Bend with a seating capacity of just over 700. The Annual

Archbishop Robert Runcie Convocation Lecture this year will be given by Father James Puglisi, SA, Director of the Centro Pro Unione in Rome and Professor of Ecumenical Theology at the Angelicum.

Father Puglisi has served on the faculty of the Foundation as The Francis Joseph Cardinal Professor of Catholic Theology since 1998. He holds the Ph.D. from the Université de Paris IV Sorbonne, the S.T.D. from the Institut Catholique de Paris and holds the chair of Ecumenical Theology at the Pontifical Athenaeum "Antonianum" in Rome. The Graduation address will be given by The Rev. Dr. Joseph Baunoch, Academic Dean of the Foundation. He has been a member of the Foundation faculty for many years as the Albert Ellis Professor of Psychology and Counseling, and is Director and President of the Association of Pastoral Counseling Supervision (APCS). He also currently serves as Administrator of the Harbor Light Systems of The Salvation Army in Detroit. Dr. Baunoch holds the D.Min. from Lutheran School of Theology and the Psy.D. from the Foundation.

HONORARY DEGREES IN 2006

Three honorary Doctor of Divinity degrees will be awarded this coming Graduation. The recipients are Monsignor Francis Phuong Van Pham of the Archdiocese of Atlanta in recognition of his years of service to the Church, particularly in his role as President of the Vietnamese Catholic Federation of Clergy, Religious, and Laity and as past President of the Vietnamese Catholic Eucharistic Youth Movement in the United States; Rabbi Alan Tuff, D.Min., of Temple Beth El in Hollywood, Florida, a graduate of the Foundation and in recognition of his outstanding leadership in the American Jewish community; and Sister Dolorette Farias, SSND, D.Min., a School Sister of Notre Dame and Foundation alumna, in recognition of her twenty-five years of service in the Church with special appreciation for her contribution to the spiritual life of the Diocese of Phoenix. Over the years the Foundation has awarded honorary doctorates to a wide roster of internationally distinguished scholars, teachers, and religious leaders.

OXFORD SCHOLAR TEACHING FOUNDATION INSTITUTE

The Rev. Dr. Robin Gibbons of Oxford University will be Visiting Professor of the Foundation this summer during his Institute on Eastern Christian Spirituality to be held in Indiana. He is an Eastern Catholic Priest-Monk attached to the Greek Catholic Melkite parish of London and teaches at Oxford University where he is also Associate Director of the Oxford University Summer Programme in Theology. His two courses during the Institute on Eastern Christian Spirituality include the morning seminar on The Eastern Christian Tradition and afternoon seminar on Spiritual Pathways. VISITING PROFESSORS OF ISLAMIC STUDIES FOR 2006

The Foundation has launched full master's and doctoral degree programs in Islamic Studies with the option to take all coursework in the Arabic language. In order to assure Muslim students of the quality of the program, the Foundation regularly identifies outstanding Islamic scholars for the teaching of our Institutes in Islamic Studies. For 2006, we have two Visiting Professors of Islamic Studies. Imam Omar Ahmed Shahin, J.D., M.Th., Ph.D. (cand.), is an officer of the North American Imam Federation and Chairman of the Islamic Center in East Valley, Arizona. He holds degrees in Islamic Studies from Omdurman Islamic University in Jordan and from Jordanian University and is licensed to practice Jurisprudence Law as an Islamic Attorney in the Courts of Amman, Jordan. Imam Shahin's two courses in 2006 will be Inheritance in Islamic Law (morning seminar) and Case Studies in Islamic Inheritance (afternoon seminar). Imam Abdulhakim Ali Mohamed, Ph.D. (cand.) is the Director of the Islamic Center in Nashville, Tennessee. He is Director of the North American Imam Federation and holds a degree in Islamic Jurisprudence (Shari'a) from the Islamic University of Medina in Saudi Arabia and a degree in Islamic Studies from Sana'a University in Yemen. Imam Mohamed's two courses in 2006 will be Allah the Creator (A.M. seminar) and Names of Allah (P.M. seminar). These two Institutes will be taught in English but fluency in Arabic is encouraged for advanced students. Full details on the Foundation's website.

INSTITUTE FACULTY USE THEIR OWN BOOKS

It is a tradition of the Foundation for its faculty to publish major works of scholarship and, when relevant, use those works as the basis for their courses taught at the Foundation. Four faculty this past autumn taught Institutes in which they used their own books as key texts for the courses. They included the Rev. Dr. Henry Chan, The Jimmy Carter Professor of Mediation and Pastoral Care, who used his recently published book, *The Mediator as Human Being: From A Study of Major Concepts of Sigmund Freud, Carl Jung, Erik Erikson, and Abraham Maslow*; The Rev. Dr. Peter Thang Cong Ngo, The Cardinal Thuan Van Nguyen Professor of Catholic Theology and Canon Law, who used his upcoming book of a major study of the Marriage Tribunal in the Catholic Church (to be published in both English and Vietnamese); Dr. Ann Graber, Professor of Logotherapy/Existential Analysis and liaison between the Foundation and the Viktor Frankl Institute of Logotherapy, who used her book, *Viktor Frankl's Logotherapy: Method of Choice in Ecumenical Pastoral Psychology*; and Dr. John Morgan, The Karl Mannheim Professor of the History and Philosophy of the Social Sciences, who used his latest book, *Naturally Good: A Behavioral History of Moral Development*.

FACULTY NOTES

Rabbi Dr. Howard Avruhm Addison has two new publications appearing this spring; a Second Edition of *The Enneagram and Kabbalah* as well as *Jewish Spiritual Direction*, which is co-edited with Barbara Breitman. Both are being published by JewishLights. Included will be his essay, "Berur: How Do You Know if it's G-d?". His works may be purchased through JewishLights at jewishlights.com. Rabbi Addison is Director of Lev Shomea, the first institute for training spiritual directors in the Jewish tradition, and is Gershom Scholem Professor of Jewish Spirituality at the Foundation.

Dr. Laura Rinaldi Dufresne was asked to participate in a lecture series accompanying the Mint Museum of Charlotte's new show "Renaissance to Rococo: Masterpieces from the Collection of the Wadsworth Atheneum." She gave a talk at the museum in October, entitled "Caravaggio and the Italian Masters: Saints, Suffering and the Sacred." Dr. Dufresne is Professor of Art History at Winthrop University in South Carolina, and serves as Professor of Religious Art History at the Foundation.

The Rev. Dr. Bill Glisson delivered the commencement address to the Lincoln's Challenge Program of Illinois on December 10. The Program is designed for youth to learn skills in leadership and self-discipline, develop job skills and work toward the GED. Dr. Glisson serves as The Justice Earl Warren Professor of Law and Social Values at the Foundation.

Dr. Ann Graber was invited to speak in Dallas, Texas, at the Jubilee Congress of the Viktor Frankl Institute in 2005, marking the 100th anniversary of Frankl's birth. She spoke on the Congress theme, *From Homo Sapiens to Homo Noeticus*, in a plenary address delivered to participants from 22 countries and was awarded The Founder's Award, the highest honor the Institute grants, for her years of meritorious service, and in particular for initiating the Distance Learning program. She served as Guest Editor for the spring 2005 issue of the Journal of Search for Meaning of The International Forum for Logotherapy, which included several articles by Foundation alumni/ae. She serves as Liaison between the Viktor Frankl Institute and the Foundation, and is Professor of Psychology/Existential Analysis at the Foundation.

Dr. C. Anthony Hunt recently delivered a lecture, entitled "Is There a Balm?: Martin Luther King, Jr., the Bible and Christian Hope" at the Fall Convocation and Open House at the Ecumenical Institute of Theology, St. Mary's Seminary and University in Baltimore, Maryland. Additionally, he delivered the Martin Luther King, Jr., Memorial Lecture entitled, "Redeeming the Dream: Remembering Beloved Community" at the William A. Keese School of Continuing Education, Asbury Methodist Village in Gaithersburg, Maryland. Dr. Hunt serves as The E. Franklin Frazier Professor of African American Studies at the Foundation.

The Rev. Dr. Marlene Kropf, in connection with her work as Minister of Worship for Mennonite Church USA, oversees teams of writers who develop church-wide worship resources for the seasons of the Christian year, published each quarter in *Leader* magazine (www.leaderonline.org). In January, her book was published by Herald Press, entitled *Preparing Sunday Dinner: A Collaborative Approach to Worship and Preaching*, which she co-authored with two faculty colleagues of the Associated Mennonite Biblical Seminary, June Alliman Yoder and Rebecca Slough. The book is available through www.heraldpress.com. Dr. Kropf serves as The William B. Oglesby, Jr., Professor of Pastoral Theology at the Foundation.

The Rev. Dr. Bernie O'Connor has been awarded the Outstanding Civilian Service Medal by the Pentagon, Department of the Army. This award was bestowed for Fr. Bernie's ten years of chaplaincy to the ROTC program at Eastern Michigan University, for his service as one of only seven academics throughout the U.S. appointed to the National Advisory Committee on ROTC Education, and for his efforts to promote Civic Education and peaceful resolution of conflicts. This was the first time such an honor was awarded to a Canadian citizen. He was honored by the Nova Scotia legislature with a Special Resolution (No. 1582) in recognition of his appointment to the Vatican Curia. He also presented a two-part lecture for the clergy of the Diocese of Haarlem, the Netherlands, in December on the theme "Essentials for the Renewal of Priestly Commitment," followed by a two-part presentation. Fr. Bernie published the articles, "A Spiritual Exercise Based Upon Pope Benedict XVI's View of Courage," and "The Church is Alive: A Reflection on the 2004 Decree for the Syro-Malabar Church" for *Inside the Vatican* and *Servizio Informazioni Chiese Orientali*, respectively.

In 2005, Fr. Bernie was appointed Chairperson of the Graduate Theological Foundation's Advisory Committee on Academic Development in Tribunal Studies, and he continues to serve as The John Henry Cardinal Newman Professor of Theology and Ecclesial Mediation at the Foundation.

Residency Option Announced

As of September 1, 2005, students of the College now have a residency option available to them which allows them to take courses in either Oxford or Rome. These fully recognized and endorsed courses are made available through the Graduate Theological Foundation. All Cloverdale College students may now enroll in summer courses in either Oxford or Rome through the Graduate Theological Foundation. A two-week residency in Oxford or Rome with written work fulfills the degree completion requirements for the B.R.E. or B.Th. All courses are taught in English. Information packets on the Oxford University Summer Programme in Theology or the ecumenical course at the Centro Pro Unione in Rome are available through the Foundation.

Language-based Degrees Offered

Cloverdale College is particularly pleased to announce that the degrees of Bachelor of Religious Education (B.R.E.) and Bachelor of Theology (B.Th.) may now be taken in the languages of English, Spanish, Arabic, or Vietnamese.

Arabic-based degrees are taken online through courses offered by Islamic American University or by attending Foundation Institutes offered by the GTF. English-based degree students may take online courses, and have a residency option which may be fulfilled by attending Foundation Institutes or attending summer courses in Oxford or Rome (*see story above*). Spanish-based or Vietnamese-based degrees have a residency requirement which may be fulfilled by taking two Foundation Institutes.

Institutes consist of two seminars (morning & afternoon) and last five days. Students wishing to fulfill their residency through Arabic, Spanish, Vietnamese-based courses may choose suitable Institutes in which all instruction and coursework is conducted in the language of their choice. Certain Institutes offered in Spanish will be held in San Antonio, Texas, and certain Institutes in Vietnamese will be held in the Archdiocese of Los Angeles.

Bachelor of Business Administration

The College has introduced the degree of Bachelor of Business Administration (B.B.A.) designed for those already involved in, or looking to enter, the field of church business administration. Cloverdale College offers students the opportunity to take seven self-selected Microsoft Office courses offered through our affiliate Solartech, a Microsoft Gold Certified Learning Solutions Partner. In addition, students are required to complete the two required courses of Environmental Ethics and Mediation, both offered online, and one elective which may be taken either online from a

Recognized and Endorsed institution, through a Cloverdale Distance Learning Module (DLM), or from any accredited college or university offering courses in religious education. More information may be viewed on our website at www.cloverdalecollege.org.

St. Paul Center for Biblical Theology

Cloverdale College will award a Certificate of Completion for the successful completion of any online course provided by the St. Paul Center for Biblical Theology of Steubenville, Ohio. Students who decide to enter Cloverdale's B.R.E. or B.Th. degree program may have this certificate apply toward the requirements of their degree. Students are not required to be accepted into a Cloverdale College degree completion program in order to earn a Certificate.

Paper Requirement: Following the completion of the online instruction for each course at the St. Paul Center for Biblical Theology, each student is required to write a 12-15 page paper demonstrating knowledge of the course's subject matter. The College requests that papers be submitted to the College by students. Papers will be evaluated by Cloverdale College Faculty.

Evaluation Fee: \$100 per course paper submitted for evaluation by Cloverdale College Faculty. Students in the B.R.E. or B.Th. program have the option of completing the online instruction provided by St. Paul. Students enrolled in either of these programs may apply 6 Certificates of Completion of St. Paul courses toward the completion of their degree. These Certificates must have been earned within the last seven years.

NOTE: The two-course core curriculum requirement for Cloverdale College is waived for those students following this regimen.

Who May Apply: Anyone holding a high school diploma or G.E.D. with five or more years of experience complete the two required courses of Environmental working in the various fields of religious education or religious office administration whose pastor, director of religious education, or superintendent will recommend

them may apply for admission to our degree-completion programs. (Cloverdale degrees are specifically designed as completion programs and as such, the College recognizes five years of experience in religious education or religious administration as fulfillment of the first three years of a bachelor's program.)

Distance Learning Course on C. S. Lewis

The film version of *The Chronicles of Narnia: The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe*, C. S. Lewis' great children's story for adults, made a big splash upon its release in December of 2005. Considered by many Christian theologians as the most poignant portrayal of the Christian message by means of a children's fantasy story, *The Chronicles of Narnia* is now being celebrated by religious and secular audiences alike. Unlike J.R.R. Tolkien's *Lord of the Rings* series, the story of Narnia was conceived intentionally as a fantasy rendition of the Christian message of forgiveness and acceptance in a world fraught with trials and deceptions as well as hope and love.

In response to this renaissance of interest in the work of C. S. Lewis, (hailed by many as the most acute apologist for the Christian faith, particularly in his now famous *Mere Christianity*), the Graduate Theological Foundation and Cloverdale College would like to draw attention to a Distance Learning Module (DLM) that has been offered for several years. The DLM is designed to fulfill one Unit of Study for Foundation students and 3 credit hours for Cloverdale College students. The DLM consists of Richard Attenborough's now classic film, *Shadowlands*, starring Sir Anthony Hopkins and Debra Winger, Lewis' autobiography, *Surprised by Joy: The Shape of My Early Life*, a Lord and King Associates' video of The Life of C. S. Lewis, and a set of audio cassettes of Lewis' letters from Satan, entitled *The Screwtape Letters*, read by John Cleese.

Following reading, viewing, and listening to these multimedia materials, the student writes a 7-10 page critical evaluation of Lewis' life and work with special consideration of his meaning and relevance in today's world. The film, *The Chronicles of Narnia*, may very well prove most helpful in the overall response to the requirements of the DLM. Interested students are encouraged to email, write, or call for the enrollment forms needed to take this Distance Learning Module. The tuition is \$500.00 for one graduate Unit of Study (GTF) and \$100.00 for 3 undergraduate credit hours (Cloverdale).
